Cycling studies is a rapidly growing area of investigation across the social sciences, reflecting and engaging with rapid transformations of urban mobility and concerns for sustainability. This volume brings together a broad range of studies of both cycling and cyclists. It examines practices, cultures and how activity is represented both practically and symbolically. It draws work from across Europe, from the cold of Lapland to the Iberian peninsula and beyond. Its concerns are both contemporary and historical, considering where we are at the moment and some of the processes that shaped how we got here, looking at cycling practices past and present. This range of topics reflects the breadth of current academic engagement with cycling studies across the social sciences and engages with the very real processes of change that are reshaping our mobility.
